## **NIJC Asylum Docketing List**

This list supplements deadlines and practice tips in NIJC's Procedural Manual for Asylum Representation

### Immediately After Receipt of the NIJC File

- Has the client applied for asylum? If not, have you docketed the filing deadline?
- Is the client eligible for a work permit? If yes, have you docketed when the client can apply?
- If the client has a work permit, have you docketed the date when you should renew the work permit (180-days before its expiration)?
- Does the client have any ICE check-ins? If yes, have you docketed those dates?
- Does the client have any court hearings? If yes, have you docketed those dates and any related deadlines?
  - o 15-day filing deadline before merits
  - Two months prior to filing deadline: send NIJC your draft affidavits
  - One month prior to filing deadline: send NIJC your draft brief

## One Month After Receipt of the NIJC File

If the case is before the immigration court:

- Have you completed EOIR E-Registry?
- Have you filed Form E28, in conjunction with a Motion to Substitute if necessary?
- Have you filed a FOIA request?
- Have you filed a biometrics request for each client?

# One Month Prior to the Master Calendar (Status) Hearing

 Have you checked-in with NIJC to confirm next steps and whether any pre-hearing filings are necessary?

# **Monthly Monitoring for All Asylum Cases**

- Have you checked the EOIR Automated Information System (for court cases) or the USCIS Case Status Update (for asylum office cases) to verify the status of the case?
- Have you verified that your appearances are on file with the correct agency?
- Have you confirmed that the next hearing date, work permit filing deadlines, and ICE check-in dates are docketed?
- Have you filed and received a response to your FOIA and biometrics requests?
- Have you spoken with your client in the past month to determine if there have been any significant life changes; if the client's contact information has changed; or if the client has any questions or concerns?

#### **Prior to the Merits Hearing**

### Six months Before the Merits Hearing

- Have you sent NIJC a case update?
- Have you docketed the internal deadlines for NIJC's review? (Send affidavits to NIJC two months before the filing deadline; send the brief one month before the filing deadline)

#### **Three Months Prior to the Filing Deadline:**

 Will you be prepared to send your draft affidavits to NIJC in one month?

## **Two Months Prior to the Filing Deadline:**

- Have you sent your draft affidavits to NIJC for review?
- Will you be prepared to send your draft brief to NIJC in one month?

#### One Month Prior to the Filing Deadline:

Have you sent NIJC a draft of your brief?



# **VAWA and U Visa Docketing List**

# **VAWA: After Receipt of the NIJC File**

- Is your client divorced from the abuser? Have you docketed the filing deadline for two years from the date the divorce was finalized?
- Does your client have a derivative child who will soon turn 21? If yes, have you docketed the filing deadline for a date before the child's 21 birthday?

# U Visa: After Receipt of the NIJC File

- Have you docketed the filing deadline for a date before the I-918B certification expires?
- Does your client have a derivative child who will soon turn 21? If yes, have you docketed the filing deadline for a date before the child's 21st birthday?

# Monthly Monitoring for VAWA and U Visa Cases

- Was your client scheduled for a biometrics appointment? If yes, did s/he attend?
- Have you submitted your filing? If yes, have you provided an electronic copy to NIJC?
- Have you or your client received any correspondence from USCIS? If yes, have you provided an electronic copy to NIJC?
- Does the current attorney of record have an appearance on file?
- Has your client moved? If yes, have you notified NIJC and filed an AR-11with the Vermont Service Center?
- Have you spoken with your client in the past six month to determine if there have been any significant life changes; if the client's contact information has changed; or if the client has any questions or concerns?

If an attorney assigned to an NIJC case is leaving the firm, please contact NIJC immediately.
